Ladybugs Can't Be Tall

Whether you're big or small celebrating your uniqueness is the central theme as you follow a ladybug's journey in discovering what she CAN do



Before:

Before you read:

Introduce the book and tell the children a little bit about it. Follow with a comment or question that is related to the story such as, there are a lot of things ladybugs can't do - what is something you love to do. Encourage a discussion so the children can comment, ask questions, and express their feelings. Set the stage for listening by asking an "I wonder" statement based on the cover illustration.

• I wonder how tall the ladybug is and how it walks?

During:

Encourage the children to comment on the illustrations, ask questions, and predict what will happen next in the story. Children gain confidence and a sense of achievement through being able to correctly predict how a story will end. Point out "rare words" (e.g., those words that are not commonly used in every day conversation) and help the children relate the meaning in a way that makes sense to them.

Rare Words in Ladybugs Can't Be Tall:

- · gills: the respiratory organ of aquatic animals, as fish, that breathe oxygen dissolved in water
- fins: a paddle-like organ attached to the body of a fish for propulsion, steering and balance
- · crawl: to move with body resting on or close to the ground, usually on hands and knees

After:

Discuss the story. Ask questions...

- Why can't ladybugs be tall?
- What happened to the ladybug who tried to swim?
- · How do ladybugs get over bumps?
- · What colors are on the ladybug?
- If ladybugs can't make honey, what insect does?
- Are ladybugs bigger or smaller than a ball?
- What do ladybugs not get the chance to do?
- Describe the bird. What does it do?
- How many ladybugs can you see on each page?





Ladybug Count

You will need: print the *Ladybug Count* sheet, one for each student.

After reading the story, walk through the story and count all the ladybugs you find. Hand out the *Ladybug Count* sheet to each child. Give each student enough time to color and match the groups of ladybugs to the correct number.
