The Little Mouse, The Red Ripe Strawberry, and The Big Hungry Bear

Beautiful full page illustrations engage children as they cheer for the adorable mouse, who frantically struggles to keep his ripe strawberry safe.





Before:

Introduce the book and tell the children a little bit about it. Follow with a comment or question that is related to the story such as, *Do you think a bear would take a strawberry from a mouse?* Encourage a discussion so the children can comment, ask questions, and express their feelings. Set the stage for listening by asking an "I wonder" statement based on the cover illustration.

• I wonder why the mouse is trying to be quiet?

During:

Encourage the children to comment on the illustrations, ask questions, and predict what will happen next in the story. Children gain confidence and a sense of achievement through being able to correctly predict how a story will end. Point out "rare words" (e.g., those words that are not commonly used in every day conversation) and help the children relate the meaning in a way that makes sense to them.

Rare Words in The Little Mouse, The Red Ripe Strawberry, and the Big Hungry Bear

- ripe: ready to eat
- mile: a unit of distance
- tromp: to walk heavily
- guarding: to protect somebody or something
- disguised: to change something's appearance to avoid recognition

After:

Discuss the story. Ask questions...

- Who was talking to the little mouse?
- What was the little mouse going to do?
- Why was the mouse afraid?
- How would the bear find the strawberry?
- What were some ways that the little mouse tried to hide the strawberry from the bear?
- Who did the mouse share the strawberry with?
- What did the mouse and the narrator do with the strawberry?
- Do you think there ever really was a bear?




Big A - Little a...

As a class match each lowercase letter to the correct uppercase letter. Once all the letters have been matched, allow the children to color each strawberry.

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







































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
