The Princess and the Pea

Elaborate paper doll cutouts, detailed miniature castle replicas and dramatic fonts set the stage for the retelling of Hans Christian Anderson's classic tale about a quest to find one-true love and the challenges of passing the queen's famous test.





Before:

Introduce the book and tell the children a little bit about it. Follow that with a comment or question that is related to the story such as, *What would you do if you had a pea in your bed?* Encourage a discussion so the children can comment, ask questions, and express their feelings. Set the stage for listening by asking an "I wonder" statement based on the cover illustration.

• I wonder what she is doing on the ladder?

During:

Encourage the children to comment on the illustrations, ask questions, and predict what will happen next in the story. Children gain confidence and a sense of achievement through being able to correctly predict how a story will end. Point out "rare words" (e.g., those words that are not commonly used in every day conversation) and help the children relate the meaning in a way that makes sense to them.

Rare Words in The Princess and the Pea

- romantic: expression of tender emotions and love
- mesmerizing: to absorb somebody's attention, to fascinate somebody or to hypnotize
- fascinating: captivating, inspiring a great interest or attraction
- royalness: relating to or belonging to a monarch family
- captured: to take somebody prisoner, to seize a place
- vain: excessively proud, especially of personal appearance
- · downcast: sad and pessimistic
- · perched: place for a bird to sit
- · shivering: tremble or shake slightly
- impeccable: perfect or flawless as to be beyond criticism
- · clattered: to make a rattling noise

After:

Discuss the story. Ask questions...

- What did the king and gueen want their son to do?
- Who did he want to marry?
- · What kind of party did they throw for the prince to meet princesses?
- What kind of princesses did he meet?
- · Where does the real princess live?
- Why was she in the forest?
- · How did she find the castle?
- What did the queen do to the bed the princess was to sleep in?
- How did the princess sleep?
- What did the prince think of the princess?
- How did the story end?



Maze After reading the story, hand out a copy of the "Maze" sheet to each child. If desired, the children can decorate the coloring page after they have helped the prince find his princess.
