Turkey Collage:

Trace children's hands on tag board. Have children decorate eyes, nose and feet. Decorate the body of the turkey using the following: dried beans, colored rice, sequins, macaroni, glitter, feathers, etc.

Pumpkin Pie Dough:

You will need:

2 cups flour

1 cup salt

2 cups water

3 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice

Orange food coloring (mix yellow and red)

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

4 teaspoons cream of tarter

Combine ingredients in large pot. Cook on low heat. Stir until dough forms and pulls away from the sides of the pot. Remove the dough and cool.

Thanksgiving Mural:

Provide mural paper and have children dictate what they are thankful for as you write on paper fruit shapes to create a cornucopia display.

Native American Headbands: Provide strips of paper, stamps and invite the children decorate and attach feathers.

Indian Vests: Cut a brown grocery bag in half. Fringe and let the children decorate with collage materials.

Pilgrim Hats: Provide a large black square with a black strip of paper attached. Let the children decorate the belt loop for hat with yellow paint and tin foil.

Turkey Centerpiece: Stuff a large paper bag with newspaper. Staple to it feet, head and goblet and then decorate with feathers, fabric scraps and sequins.

Play dough Bead Necklaces:

Children can make their own beads for necklaces. You will need 2 cups flour, 1 cup salt, 1 cup water, 1 tsp. cooking oil. Have children measure and mix all ingredients together until smooth. Give each child a small lump some to make small balls or ovals. They can make holes by pushing a toothpick through the center. The beads need to dry for several days. Have children turn their beads several times while they are drying. These beads can be painted with tempera paint or colored markers. Use twine or lanyard to string.

Thankerchief:

Have the children sit in a large circle. Pass a handkerchief around until the end of the poem. When it stops, have he/she say what they are thankful for.
